Q&A with Cath Howe

All of your books are praised for addressing important issues. How do you decide what to tackle in each book?

I choose characters and try to follow where they lead. In *The Insiders*, I had the idea of Billy and the school at night and that made me ask why he might choose to sleep in school. There are issues all around us but I don't want to write "book about issues" so much as find a way to reflect how the world is and how complicated it is to navigate.

In *The Insiders* I couldn't ever decide which character I was backing and who was in the wrong. Who are your favourite lovable/misunderstood villains?


Yes, that's how I hoped you would feel. In *The Insiders*, I felt a real affection for Billy- he is in a tangle. There have been lots of Billys in my teaching career. He's got a lot of charm.

I was interested in the idea of you rooting for someone while watching them mess up. My favourite "villain" in another book would be Stanley in *Holes* by Louis Sachar. He is incredibly relatable. I do think there's a bit of a villain in all of us.

If you were locked in a school overnight, what would you do?

I would definitely visit the staffroom and root around for cake. It's that feeling of being somewhere forbidden. I'd wander around, just the way Billy does.





Knights Of 5+



Firefly 7+


