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Book of the Month The Boy in the Suit James Fox


James Fox's debut novel, The Boy in the Suit is our book of the month!

Get ready to meet Solo, a ten-year-old boy with a big heart and some tough challenges. James Fox's debut novel, The Boy in the Suit, is an awesome story that shows us what it's like to feel different and out of place. It's perfect for kids in Year 6 or older.

Solo's life isn't easy—his family doesn't have a lot of money, and he wears a suit that doesn't quite fit, from a charity shop. This suit isn't just about clothes; it shows how Solo feels about himself, like he's carrying a heavy load. But even when things are hard, Solo keeps going and tries to find his place in a world that can sometimes feel tough.

The story is set in the current cost-of-living crisis, and it tackles important topics like money problems, mental health, and fitting in. But even though it touches on some serious stuff, Fox adds plenty of humour and warmth, making it both funny and heartfelt. One funny, yet touching, moment happens right at the start when Solo and his mum, Morag, sneak into funerals to get free food! It sounds wild, but it sets the stage for a story that's full of surprises.

One cool thing about the book is how real it feels. Fox shows how hard life can be, but also how brave Solo is as he deals with things like bullying, feeling different, and his mum's struggles with her mental health (which they call the "Big Bad Reds"). Morag is a loving mum, but she's also fighting her own battles, and that's what makes her so interesting. She's strong but also vulnerable, which makes her and Solo's relationship super touching.

Chris Haugton



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Alexander Armstrong

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
