Hunton & Arrathorne School is committed to playing its part in tackling the climate crisis by taking meaningful, practical, and sustainable action. As a rural primary school at the heart of our community, we recognise our responsibility to reduce our environmental impact and help prepare our pupils to become informed, responsible citizens in a changing world.

This Climate Action Plan sets out our vision and strategy for becoming a more sustainable school. It is based on four key pillars: reducing carbon emissions, increasing climate resilience, enhancing biodiversity, and embedding sustainability across our curriculum and school culture. Our approach reflects the Department for Education's guidance and supports the national ambition to reach net zero by 2050.

We will measure and reduce our energy use, improve waste and water management, promote active and sustainable travel, and ensure our buildings and grounds are more climate resilient. Alongside this, we will provide learning opportunities that empower our pupils to understand and address environmental challenges, both locally and globally.

This plan is a starting point. We will review our progress regularly and work closely with staff, pupils, families, and the wider community to make sustainability a core part of school life at Hunton & Arrathorne.
