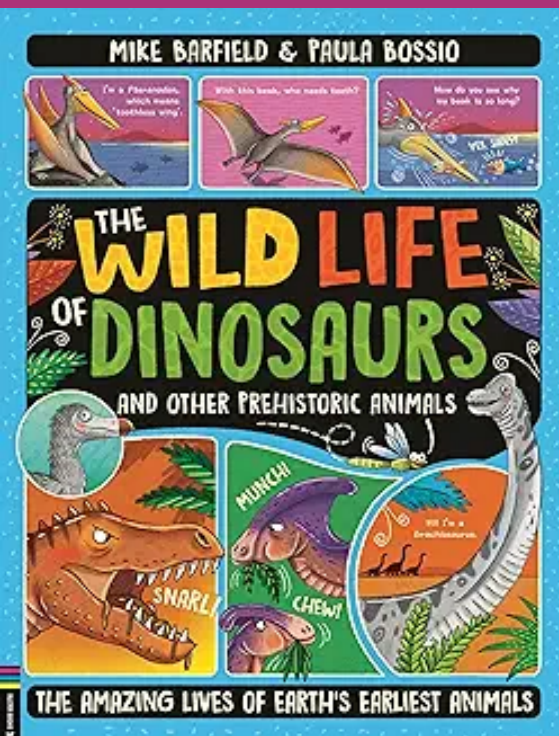

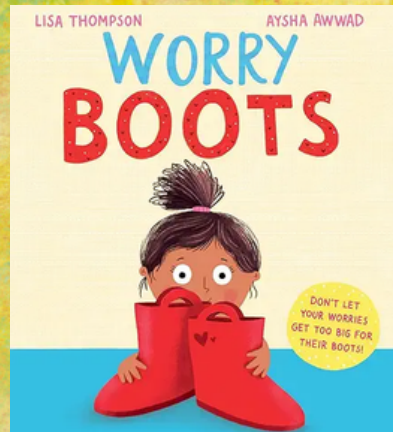

Scholastic 3+

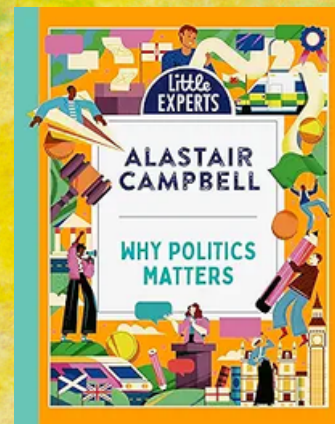

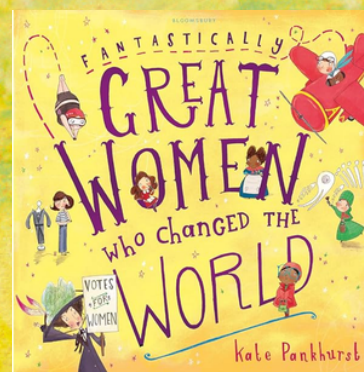

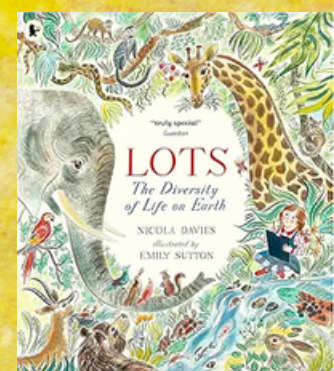
